with an oversample of 100 Asian Americans

Presented by Cornell Belcher, November 2025

Methodology

These findings are from a proprietary survey conducted by **brilliant corners Research & Strategies** for **The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights**.

This is a national survey of 1003 likely voters, plus an additional oversample of 100 Asian likely voters.

The survey was conducted by phone, using professional interviewers starting on October 30th and ending on November 6th, 2025.

The survey's sample was drawn randomly from the voter file and geographically stratified for proportional representation. The data was weighted slightly to adhere to population demographics of voters in the voter file. The margin of error overall is +/- 3.1 percent, with a 95 percent confidence interval. The margin of error for sub-groups will be higher depending on the size of the sub-group sample and the size of the actual response to any given question.



Vote Motivation





Satisfaction with Direction of Country





(Total satisfied – total dissatisfied)




Satisfaction with Direction of Country










Most important election issues






















There has been a steady increase in the number of nonwhite voters who say they are experiencing daily racism over the last two years

Q30. And how often would you say you experience racism or discrimination in your everyday life? – would you say very often, not often, or not at all?



Experience Sexism






































Most voters vote and believe it makes a difference, but views are mixed on the other actions




"Can Affect Change" ← By Ideology → "Likely to Do"






[SCHOOL FUNDS] Taking away funding from schools, colleges, and nonprofits for ideological disputes, like the use of diversity equity and inclusion policies, via executive orders

[ICE] Using ICE to round up and deport people without due process even if it is not to their country of origin





[DIVERSITY IS NOT THE ENEMY]


